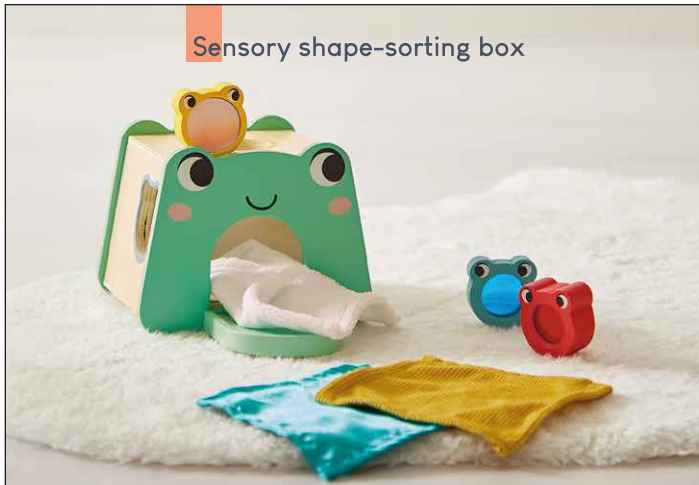


### Sensory shape-sorting box



This wooden sensory shape sorter has it all! Your child will develop their **hand-eye coordination** (bimanual and oculo-manual) by slotting the 3 small coloured frogs; each of which boasts a different sensory function (mirror, coloured glasses). Magic: watch the shapes slide down and exit through the little trap door! Serves as the perfect introduction to the **cause and effect concept**.

In order to grow, children must develop their sense of touch. 3 small pieces of fabric – each with a different texture – hide inside the frog. Children can try to prise them out by putting their hand into the frog’s mouth and pulling on them.

### Cloud-shaped rain stick



This cloud-shaped wooden rain stick will have a helping hand in your child’s **musical awakening**. When shaken, the beads mimic the sound of falling rain. Its ergonomic design can easily be grasped by little ones, and therefore, promotes the development of their **fine motor skills**.

#### MY CHILD’S DEVELOPMENT AT 12 MONTHS

Your child is about to blow out their first candle! They are increasingly putting their fine motor skills to use by manipulating different-sized objects and communicating more with their hands, whilst babbling of course. Their gross motor skills are also coming along nicely. They may even decide to take their first steps any day now.

*To each their own pace: The above-mentioned skills are simply benchmarks and should in no way be followed to the letter; each child develops at their own pace.*

### Pond pyramid



This pond-themed round cardboard pyramid toy helps develop **fine motor skills** and the **senses**. First mode of play: children can hide the two ducks beneath the cylinders as a “find the duck” game. Second mode of play: constructing the pyramid by stacking the 3 cardboard pieces on top of one another.

### Water lilies peg puzzle



This wooden peg puzzle consists of 3 water lily-shaped pieces and is ideal for developing **fine motor skills**. The pegs make the puzzle pieces easier to grip and help your child master pinching their fingers, which will be very useful for learning to write in the not so distant future.

This puzzle also denotes the **notion of size**: the 3 pieces are all different sizes and hide different-sized fishes (small, medium and large) underneath.



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
