

Complementary activities









In order to make the most of your box, we've come up with some complementary activities. These activities will help you to make the toys last longer. With the new ideas for play suggested here, your child will be able to use the box beyond the specified age! We can also help you set up these activities so that you can make the most of them and help your child develop their skills.

To each their own pace: The skills mentioned are benchmarks and by no means a general rule, as each child develops at their own pace.

Learning colours generally begins at around 24 months. Naming colours is not easy for a child because the words are abstract for them. It's essential to support your child in this process, by regularly repeating the names of the colours and showing them to them.

Skills developed: Observation and vocabulary

Rules of the game: The child chooses a card which has a series of colours on it. To start with, the child can tap on the appropriate bell in the order shown. Then they can name each colour. Blank cards are provided so that you can create your own colour sequence with your child.


The notion of size can be grasped in different ways: by manipulating or by observing the object. It is a complex subject that will be worked on throughout their schooling.


Skills developed: Observation and reasoning skills







Rules of the game: Here the child will sort the leaf-shaped pieces according to their size (2 sizes are available). After cutting out the 2 large leaves in paper, the child can position the smaller pieces on one and the larger pieces on the other.














Activity 1
