

Geometric shape stacking toy



Construction games are apt for encouraging your child to work on their **reasoning and 3D visuoconstruction skills**. This wooden stacking toy comprises 3 poles; each of which boasts 4 different-coloured pieces. As part of this fun yet educational game, children must select one of the 6 model cards and replicate what they see.

This stacking toy is a complete toy that will put your child's cognitive functions to the test, and will introduce them to the concept of **game rules**, whilst developing their vocabulary and counting skills.

Pond sound-producing toy



This soft-toned wooden chime is the ideal toy for calming moments with your little one. They can use the reed stick to tap on the wooden slats or glide the stick over all the slats to hear all the different tones.

Each wooden slat boasts a coloured dot. This is a great way to learn colours and start creating short sound sequences (below example of score). This pond sound-producing toy is bound to develop children's **concentration skills and musical awakening**.

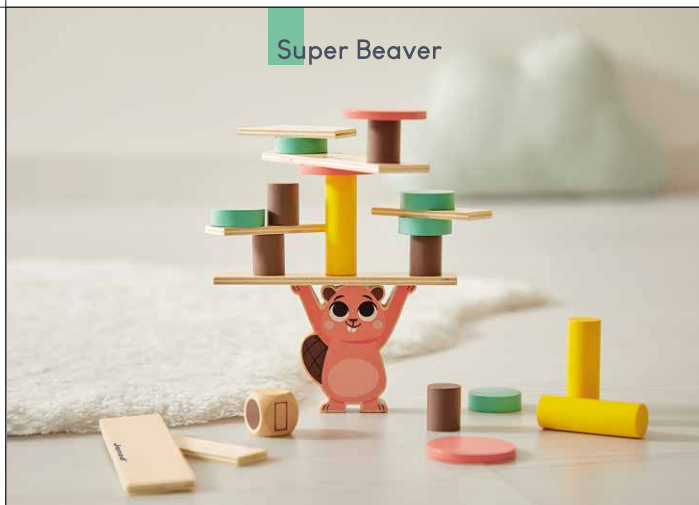

MY CHILD'S DEVELOPMENT AT 36 MONTHS

Your child is fully aware of their surrounding environments. They have mastered emotions and are now able to use these to express and explain how they feel. They love anything that involves creativity, pretend play and reflection. At 36 months, your child is evolving in many ways and starting to become more independent.

To each their own pace: The above-mentioned skills are simply benchmarks and should in no way be followed to the letter; each child develops at their own pace.

Super Beaver



Who is the strongest? Super Beaver of course! Children are tasked individually or with others to position the 26 wooden pieces on the Super Beaver without any of the pieces falling off. To start off: roll the die to find out which token colour must be used.

Another game variant: don't use the die and let children make their own constructions. This toy promotes your child's concentration, **reflection**, planning and **imagination skills**.

Facial expression game



How do you feel today? This puzzle is perfect for encouraging your child to **express and understand their emotions**. The 4 primary emotions (joy, sadness, fear and anger) are represented by 3 cardboard pieces that can be positioned on the board. Each emotion boasts a specific colour to help children complete the puzzle.

This 3-piece puzzle covers a specific area of the face that is typically affected by emotions. Perfect for helping your child read facial emotion cues.
